**NOTICES OF MOTIONS**

**I. Rt. Hon. Prime Minister:**

That this Assembly –

In accordance with Article 112(3) of the Namibian Constitution –

*Approves* the nomination by His Excellency the President of Ms. Imelda Katjau as a Commissioner of the Public Service Commission for a period of five years.

**II. Hon. Smit:**

That this Assembly –

*Discusses* that this House carries out a comprehensive inquiry into all aspects of the procedures dictating the tender awarding processes of the Central Procurement Board of Namibia.

There is growing public concern regarding the operations and decisions of the Central Procurement Board of Namibia, which was established by the Public Procurement Act 15 of 2015. Distrust, perceptions of procedural unfairness, corruption, insider trading and manipulation, are regular themes of public discourse as it relates to the tender awarding process. It is against this background that an inquiry is of urgency.

Further, that this Motion be referred to the relevant Parliamentary Standing Committee for further scrutiny and report back.

**III. Hon. Smit:**

That this Assembly –

*Discusses* that this House carries out an investigation and full audit of the expenditure of the N\$14.1 Billion budget allocated to the Ministry of Education, Arts and Culture for education – with a comprehensive view into infrastructure and textbook expenditure.

That this audit is tasked to a team comprised of the Auditor General along with 2 – 3 retired judges, who will submit their report to the Public Accounts Committee of Parliament, who will report to this House.

Further, that this Motion be referred to the relevant Parliamentary Standing Committee for further scrutiny and report back.

**IV. Hon. Kavekatora:**

That this Assembly –

*Deliberate* and find *solutions* to the devastating effect the increasing seal population has on the sustainable harvesting of our fish stock.

Our fish is facing depletion if remedial actions are not taken as a matter of urgency.

That this Motion be referred to a relevant Parliamentary Standing Committee for further investigation and report back to this august House.

**V. Deputy Minister of Works and Transport:**

That this Assembly –

*Discuss* the possibility to investigate the overcharges, and unethical multiple charges resulting into over profiteering by Commercial Banks in Namibia's perpetual colonial legacy of class and race discrimination against their clients.
